

The TBSAB02/TBSAB02DR are 4+1 channel analogue to SDI-12 interfaces for 24 Bit A/D conversion of sensor signals. A/D conversion and configuration is controlled via SDI-12 commands. The interfaces are equipped with signal conditioning circuits which can be customized for various input voltage ranges. It offers low current consumption and is available in a Fibox PC081206 IP67 rated housing and in a DIN-rail housing.

Each channel can be independently scaled with a 3rd order polynomial to enable gain and offset calibration of the connected sensors.

A built in 3 wire interface for direct connection of PT100/PT1000 offers additional versatility.

The TBSAB02 / TBSAB02DR provide digital signals for the power management of the connected sensors. Four on-board, SDI-12 controlled high side FET- switches are provided to power on/off connected sensors.

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1 Introduction

The TBSAB02(DR)(DR) is a 24 Bit analogue to SDI-12 interface to connect sensors with voltage or current loop outputs to SDI-12 networks.

To extend its scope of application, the TBSAB02(DR) offers direct connectivity to PT100 or PT1000 temperature sensors via a 3-wire interface.

1.1 Measurement

The TBSAB02(DR) offers 5 input channels:

Channel 0 0V ... 2.5V Channel 1 0V ... 2.5V Channel 2 0V ... 2.5V Channel 3 0V ... 2.5V Channel 4 PT100/PT1000

On board temperature sensor

Reference voltage: 2.5V, 0.025%, 2ppm/°C ADC Resolution: 24 Bit, 19 Bit ENOB

1.2 Product Features

1.3 Calibration

Any offset or gain error of the analogue system (sensor + TBSAB02(DR) analogue frontend) can be compensated using the scaling capability of the TBSAB02(DR).



1.4 Installation

The TBSAB02(DR) is compatible with any data logger or remote telemetry unit with SDI-12 interface. Refer to the data logger or RTU manual and to chapter 2 of this datasheet.

1.5 SDI-12

SDI-12 is a standard for interfacing data recorders with microprocessor-based sensors. SDI-12 stands for serial/digital interface at 1200 baud. It can connect multiple sensors with a single data recorder on one cable. It supports up to 60 meter cable between a sensor and a data logger.




Figure 1 – Analogue sensors connected to TBSAB02(DR) and to TBS03 SDI-12 to USB converter; setup for controlling / testing sensors and for PC based data recording




Figure 2 - Analogue sensors connected to TBSAB02(DR) and to Remote Telemetry Unit or Data Recorder



3 Hardware Description

3.1 Board overview




Figure 3 – TBSAB02 Board Connections, Jumper Settings; default: voltage measurement






Figure 4 – TBSAB02DR Board Connections, Jumper Settings Refer to Figure 3. Settings for J1 to J8 are identical with TBSAB02; default set to voltage measurement

The TBSAB02(DR) is based on a sensor front end with a 24 Bit ADC, low noise programmable gain amplifier and a precision voltage reference. A true continuous background calibration feature minimizes gain and offset errors across time and temperature. A microcontroller controls the analogue section, power management and the SDI-12 communication.



3.2 TBSAB02 connections

4 Pin terminal blocks:

CON6 - SDI-12 Interface

Shield: connect to the shield of the SDI-12 cable or leave it unconnected *Ground:* connect to the GND wire of the SDI-12 cable SDI-12 data: connect to the data wire of the SDI-12 cable 6-12V supply: connect to the positive supply voltage wire of the SDI-12 cable

4 Pin terminal blocks:

CON1 – Analogue input channel 0 – voltage / current loop input; 6-12V sensor supply voltage output CON2 – Analogue input channel 1 – voltage / current loop input; 6-12V sensor supply voltage output CON3 – Analogue input channel 2 – voltage / current loop input; 6-12V sensor supply voltage output CON4 – Analogue input channel 3 – voltage / current loop input; 6-12V sensor supply voltage output

Ground: connect to sensor GND

Analogue input: connect to the ratio metric voltage or current output of the sensor

VCC: connect to the sensor supply input. The output voltage is equivalent to the SDI-12 supply voltage and gets switched on during an SDI-12 measurement process concerning the respective channel.

DIFF_IN: reserved for future use

CON5 – PT100/PT1000 3-wire interface. Connect the PTC according Figure 6. The PTC type and the unit (Celsius or Fahrenheit) can be selected with extended SDI-12 commands.

Jumpers:

- J1 Analogue input channel 0 voltage input / current loop input selection
- J2 Analogue input channel 1 voltage input / current loop input selection
- J3 Analogue input channel 2 voltage input / current loop input selection
- J4 Analogue input channel 3 voltage input / current loop input selection

Refer to Figure 3 for the jumper positions. "Blue" refers to the jumper position for voltage input mode; "green" refers to current loop mode.



3.3 Voltage measurement mode




Figure 5 – Sensor with ratio metric voltage output connected to TBSAB02(DR)

Connect sensors with ratio metric voltage output to the TBSAB02(DR) according to figures 3/4. Input Voltage Range: 0...2,5V; other ranges available upon order

3.4 Current loop mode




Figure 6 - Loop powered sensor connected to TBSAB02(DR)

Connect loop powered sensors to the TBSAB02(DR) according figures 3/5.

A 4 - 20mA current loop translates into a 0,4V – 2V voltage drop across the 100 Ohm loop termination resistor.



3.5 PT100/PT1000 interface




Figure 7 – PT100/PT1000 temperature sensor connected to TBSAB02(DR)

Connect PT100 or PT1000 sensors to the TBSAB02(DR) according figures 3/6.

The TBSAB02(DR) will directly output the temperature in Celsius or Fahrenheit. The unit can be set with an extended SDI-12 command.

3.6 Calibration

The TBSAB02(DR) is factory calibrated with respect to offset errors and gain errors of the analogue signal chain. The TBSAB02(DR) has excellent long term stability with respect to offset and gain errors:

Offset drift over time: 100nV/1000hrs Gain drift over time: 1.6ppm/100hrs

In case that the user wants to re-calibrate the TBSAB02(DR), a two or three step calibration process has to be carried out. The current calibration can be skipped, if no current loop sensors are being connected.

Offset error calibration:

Short all 4 analogue inputs to ground by setting jumpers J5, J6, J7, J8 according figure 3. After grounding the inputs, issue the **aXOVL!** command. Remove the jumpers after calibration.

Gain error calibration:

Connect all analogue input pins to the onboard precision 2,5V reference voltage by setting jumpers J5, J6, J7, J8 according figure 3. Issue the **aXOVH!** command. Remove the jumpers after calibration.

Current calibration:

Connect a precision 10mA current source the same way as the current loop sensor in Figure 5. Issue the **aXOAn!** command.

5 Functional Description

5.1 Overview

The SDI-12 standard defines a set of commands to configure sensors and to initiate measurements. Upon receiving specific commands, the sensor may carry out internal tasks, respond with information on conversion time or send measurement data.

SDI-12 commands are typically ASCII strings which are generated by the data recorder/controller firmware. The TBSAB02(DR) can be connected to a TBS03 SDI-12 to USB converter and controlled by a PC application, such as hyper terminal software for example. TBS03 converts the command strings to the logic levels and baud rate specified by the SDI-12 standard. Furthermore, TBS03 handles breaks, marks and all other details of the SDI-12 protocol.

Upon receiving data or status information originated by TBSAB02(DR), the TBS03 extracts the corresponding ASCII strings and sends them to the USB Virtual COM Port of the PC.

In remote applications, TBSAB02(DR) can be connected to a data logger, a data terminal or a Radio Telemetry Unit with a SDI-12 interface.

5.2 SDI-12 Basics

The SDI-12 is a serial data communication standard for interfacing multiple sensors with a data recorder. SDI-12 uses a shared bus with 3 wires: power (+12V), data, ground Data rate: 1200 baud. Each sensor at the bus gets a unique address which is in the range ASCII [0-9, a-z, A-Z]. The default address of every sensor is ASCII[0]. When setting up a SDI-12 sensor network, every sensor needs to be configured with a unique address. This can be done using the Change Address Command. A sensor can typically measure one or more parameters. Sensor manufacturers usually specify 'Extended Commands' to configure or calibrate sensors. These commands are specified by the manufacturer, but they follow the command structure specified by SDI-12.

A typical recorder/sensor measurement sequence proceeds as follows:

- 1) The data recorder wakes all sensors on the SDI-12 bus with a break.
- 2) The recorder transmits a command to a specific, addressed sensor, instructing it to make a measurement.
- **3)** The addressed sensor responds within 15.0 milliseconds, returning the maximum time until the measurement data will be ready and the number of data values it will return.
- **4)** If the measurement is immediately available, the recorder transmits a command to the sensor instructing it to return the measurement result(s). If the measurement is not ready, the data recorder waits for the sensor to send a request to the recorder, which indicates that the data is ready. The recorder then transmits a command to get the data.
- **5)** The sensor responds, returning one or more measurement results.

SDI-12 Command Structure:

Each SDI-12 command is an ASCII string with up to 5 characters, starting with the sensor address and terminated by a "!" character.

Example:

Send Identification Command 0!!

0 is the sensor address (sensor zero). Upon receiving this command, the sensor will send an ASCII string containing sensor address, SDI-12 compatibility number, company name, sensor model number, sensor version number and sensor serial number.



The standard process to carry out a measurement is to send a measurement request upon which the sensor responds with the time that is required to carry out the measurement and the number of data items being returned. After waiting the time that the sensor requires to carry out the measurement, the data recorder sends a "Read Command" to get the measurement results.

Example:

Start Measurement Command 0M1!

A TBSAB02(DR) with address 0 may respond **00011** which means the measurement will take 1 second and deliver 1 value.

After min. 1 second, the data recorder can send the "Read Data Command" **0D0!** to which Sensor 0 might reply **0+1.25639842**. +1.25639842 is the measurement result which is corresponding to 1.25639842 Volt.

The response string of a sensor is always in ASCII format and may contain up to 40 or up to 80 characters, depending on the type of command. Out of 40 or 80 characters, the values part of the response string may contain up to 35 or 75 characters.

5.3 Sensor Identification

The TBSAB02(DR) will respond with following string upon sending the "Send Identification" command al!:

allcccccccmmmmmvvvxxxxxxxxxxxxxCR><LF>

Where: 0 SDI-12 Sensor address

5.4 Sensor Address

Each TBSAB02(DR) is delivered with a default address of "0"

The TBSAB02(DR) accepts SDI-12 addresses in the range "0" to "9", "A" to "Z" and "a" to "z". Setting the address of the TBSAB02(DR) can be done using the "Change Address Command" aAb!.

Note:

- If the new address is invalid, the current address will be kept.
- The TBSAB02(DR) sensor will remain unresponsive for approximately 1 second while the new address is saved in the EEPROM memory.
- The TBSAB02(DR) sensor interface supports "?" as an address only for "Acknowledge Active" Command a!.



5.5 Measurement

The TBSAB02(DR) sensor interface accepts the "Start Measurement" Command aM!, "Additional Measurement" Commands aMn! and "Start Concurrent Measurement" Commands aC!, "Additional Concurrent Measurement" Commands aCn! for obtaining calibrated values from the probe. Furthermore it supports aMC!, aMCn!, aCC!, aCCn! Commands which add a CRC to the measurement response.

The TBSAB02(DR) sensor interface will not support the "Continuous Measurement" Command aRn! and "Continuous Measurement and Request CRC" Command aRCn!. The TBSAB02(DR) sensor will respond with its address followed by <CR><LF> in response to this command.

The response to "Start Measurement" aM!, "Additional Measurement" Commands aMn! and "Start Concurrent Measurement" Command aC!, the "Additional Concurrent Measurement" Command aCn! reports the response time and how many sensor values - Voltage Level and/or Temperature - will be sent. In order to receive the desired sensor values, the recorder needs to issue the corresponding "Send Data" Command(s) aDn!.

Note: The TBSAB02(DR) sensor interface uses a format of "sign" followed by n digits. Voltage measurement results have 9 digits. The position of the decimal point may differ, depending on scaling. Temperature measurement results have up to 6 digits.

The value 1.25639842 is the voltage measured at the input of channel1. The voltage is represented by 9 digits. The maximum measurable input voltage is +2.49999999V. If the input voltage exceeds the input range of 0 to 2.49999999V, an input voltage overflow can be indicated by delivering an output value of 999999999. To set the TBSAB02(DR) to indicate an input voltage overflow, it is required to issue the extended SDI-12 command **aXIS!**. The position of the decimal point may differ, depending on scaling.

6 Application Example

This chapter is a practical guide on how to set up a TBSAB02(DR), interface it to a PC with a TBS03 SDI-12 to USB converter and carry out measurements.

6.1 Setting up TBSAB02(DR) together with TBS03

6.1.1 Requirements

User Interface

Any hyper terminal (e.g.: Windows Hyper Terminal, <u>Terminal V1.9B</u>, <u>RealTerm</u>) or specific application software (e.g. LabVIEW VI)

Hardware Interface

PC or laptop with USB interface and mini USB-B cable (USB cable supplied with TBS03)

6.1.2 Driver

Silicon Labs CP210x driver must be installed on PC (on CD supplied with TBS03 or download from <u>Silicon Labs</u>)

Do not connect TBS03 to the PC, when starting the CP2102 driver installation process!

- 1) Start the driver installation executable
- 2) Follow the installation instructions step by step until the driver installation process is finished
- 3) The system may need to restart
- 4) Upon restart after successful driver installation (and not before), connect the TBS03 to the USB interface of the PC
- 5) Wait until you get the notification that the new hardware has been installed and are ready to use.



Some terminal programs need manual COM port set up.

Open the hardware manager to check the COM port number assigned to the Silicon Labs USB bridge.

Every TBS03 device is serialized with an individual number. This enables the use of several TBS03's in parallel on a single PC or Laptop.

6.2 Hardware

- Connect the USB / SDI-12 Converter to the PC via USB port.
- Connect the TBS03 SDI-12 data interface to the TBSAB02(DR) Analogue to SDI-12 Interface.
- Connect a voltage source 0 < V < 2,5V to channel 0



6.2.1 Setting up the HyperTerminal application

- Open the hardware manager to check the COM port number assigned to the Silicon Labs USB bridge.
- Start the Windows HyperTerminal application.
- Connect to the COM Port assigned to the SDI-12 USB converter.
- Set the COM speed to 19200, 8 Bits, No Parity, 1 Stop Bit, No Handshake.
- In Settings, click "ASCII Setup" and activate "Send line ends with line feed" and "Echo typed characters locally".

6.3 Operation

6.3.1 SDI-12 / USB converter transfer mode

Every mode of TBS03 needs to be initialized with an ASCII string. Upon reception, the TBS03 will switch into the initialized mode and remain in this mode until the device receives an initialization string for another mode or the device gets disconnected. At the start up time, "Transfer Mode" is the default mode.

Transfer Mode initialisation:

In Windows hyper terminal, enter run sdi recorder and press the enter key (or <CR><LF>)

The TBS03 will respond with ACK<CR><LF>




Figure 8 – TBS03 Transfer mode initialization using Windows Hyper Terminal

The TBS03 is now in transfer mode and ready to transfer commands to the sensor and respond data to the PC.

The following screenshots show how to communicate with the TBSAB02(DR).

TBS03: Entering *0!!* <CR><LF> will respond with the sensor ID:

TBSAB02(DR) response: 013TEKBOXVN LCSMP1.0000005<CR><LF>

Upon sending the ID command **0I!**, the sensor responds with SDI-12 compatibility level, Manufacturer name, Model name, Firmware release number and Serial number




Figure 9-TBSAB02(DR), sensor response to ID command 0!!

TBS03: Entering **0M!** <CR><LF> will respond with:

TSMP01 response: 00011 <CR><LF>

which means that the sensor will be able to deliver 1 value after an acquisition time of 1 second






Figure 10-TBSAB02(DR) response to Start Measurement command OM!

TBS03: Entering *OD0!* <CR><LF> will respond with:

Sensor response: 0+1.64732480 < CR><LF>

where 1.64732480 is the voltage measured at channel 0




Figure 11 – TBSAB02(DR) response to Send Data command 0D0!

Other SDI commands will work similarly.

6.3.2 Auto-measurement mode

Auto-measurement mode is only available on TBS03 with option OTBS03-1 or option OTBS03-2

Like SDI Transfer commands, this application sends measurement commands which are set up by the user, to the SDI-12 / USB interface. Then, it automatically collects measured data by sending aDn! commands and transfers the data via USB Interface. After that, the next measurement command is started with a user defined time interval in-between consecutive measurements. The maximum timer value is 4294967295ms. The maximum number of different SDI-12 measurement commands in an auto measurement string is 9. Auto-measurement mode is stopped by sending stop < CR > LF >

Syntax: run auto <measurement command 1> <timer value 1> ... <measurement command n> <timer value n>

Example of controlling a TBSAB02(DR) in auto measurement mode:



TBS03: Entering *run auto 0M!* **200**<CR><LF> will respond with periodically measuring voltage values at channel 1. The time interval between two consecutive measurements is 200ms:




Figure 12 -TBSAB02(DR); Noise



7 Tools for TBS03

The TBS03 can be controlled using hyper terminals or customized PC application software. National Instruments, for example, offers a LabView SDI-12 API which could be used for designing customized applications for TBS03.

When using Hyper Terminal programs, take care that the representation of <CR><LF> may be different for different programs.

Windows Hyper Terminal requires activation of "Send line ends with line feed" in ASCII setup and thereafter pressing the ENTER-key results in <CR><LF>

Many Hyper Terminal programs require \n at the end of each SDI-12 string – e.g. *OM!\n or run sdi recorder\n*

<u>Terminal v1.9b – 20080315β – by Br@y ++</u> requires adding \$0D\$0A for <CR><LF>. This tool offers user defined macros for frequently used commands - a convenient feature when working with TBS03.




Figure 13 - Terminal v1.9b, defining Macros for mode initialization and SDI-12 commands



When manually entering commands in Terminal v1.9b, tick the CR=CR+LF and +CR box.




Figure 14 - Example set up of Terminal v1.9b
